

US Sanctions Coordinator Jim O'Brien Reports Increase in Transit of Electronic Items through Georgia to Russia

Head of the US Office of Sanctions Coordination, Jim O'Brien, spoke about the increase in the transit of electronic goods through Georgia to Russia in an interview with Voice of America.

According to O'Brien, electronic items enter Russia through third countries, and Georgia is one of the transit points. He highlighted that the transit of critical electronics through Georgia to Russia is a clear violation of the UN Charter and the basis for sanctions and export controls.

O'Brien noted that this kind of trade might look like a good business opportunity to someone in these countries, but they should know by now that it violates sanctions and could potentially contribute to the conflict in the region. He urged all involved parties to be very careful and avoid this kind of trade.

In response to the journalist's question on whether Georgia is knowingly or unknowingly supporting Russia and helping them obtain sensitive electronics, O'Brien clarified that Georgia complies with financial sanctions but the country has seen a rise in the transit of electronic goods to Russia. He further explained that this trade was legal until the end of the year when the



European Union and G7 members imposed restrictions on these goods.

O'Brien expressed his hope that the businesses involved in this kind of trading will realize that it worked at one point, but it's over now, and it needs to stop. He expects the transit data

to decrease quickly. The US sanctions coordinator's statements indicate that the US government is closely monitoring the situation and urging businesses to comply with the restrictions imposed by the EU and G7 members:

"I would say that in terms of

financial sanctions, Georgia fulfills the sanctions very diligently. However, we have seen an increase in the transit of electronic goods from Georgia to Russia. As I mentioned at the beginning, much of this trade was legal until the end of the year, when the European Union and G7 mem-

bers imposed restrictions on these goods. We expect this transit data to decrease very quickly. I hope that the businesses that have been involved in this kind of trading will realize that it worked at one point in time, which is now over, and that it needs to stop now," O'Brien stated.

The Ministry of Defense clarified that Georgia's decision not to participate in the exercise was based on its strategic goals and objectives. The Defense Forces have decided to focus more on international and local exercises that prioritize combat readiness, interoperability with NATO member and partner countries, sharing experience, and improving professional skills.

The Ministry emphasized that the Defense Forces are constantly engaged in hosting and

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participating in international exercises aimed at increasing their combat capabilities. The Ministry's statement aims to counter the false information being spread by certain media outlets and individuals with a political agenda.

Georgia and the United

States have a long-standing strategic partnership, and the Defense Forces of both countries have cooperated closely in the past. While Georgia will not be participating in Defender 2023, it will continue to work with the US military and other NATO members and partners to enhance regional security and stability.

"The Ministry of Defense of Georgia responds to the information spread by certain media outlets and individuals with a political agenda about the participation of the Georgian Defense Forces in the multinational exercise Defender 2023 organized by the US European Command. Unfortunately, the mentioned biased information

represents another provocation towards the Ministry of Defense.

Regarding the direct participation of Georgia in the exercise 'Defender 2023', we would like to remind you that based on the goals and objectives of the defense forces, through active communication with our main strategic partner and their recommendation, it was decided to di-

rect more efforts and resources to such international and local exercises that they take more into account the tasks mentioned above, including increasing combat readiness, increasing interoperability with NATO member and partner countries, sharing experience and improving professional skills," the agency said.

Chairman of Georgia's Foreign Relations Committee Meets with UK Ambassador to Georgia

The press service of the Parliament of Georgia has announced that Nikoloz Samkharadze, who serves as the Chairman of the Parliament's Foreign Relations Committee, has held a meeting with Mark Clayton, the Ambassador of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland to Georgia.

During the meeting, the parties discussed the current state of bilateral relations between their respective countries and explored opportunities to further strengthen these ties at the par-

liamentary level. Additionally, they highlighted the upcoming visit of a delegation from the Georgian Parliament to Great Britain as significant.

Samkharadze discussed Georgia's aspirations towards European and Euro-Atlantic integration with the ambassador, and also shared details about the

progress made and reforms implemented towards achieving these goals.

At the meeting, we discussed regional and global security issues, Georgia's European and Euro-Atlantic aspirations, and steps taken. We talked about the upcoming NATO summit and the expectations of the Georgian government in this direction," said Samkharadze.
