### Georgia Aims to Progress to Next Phase for EU Accession Negotiations, Says Foreign Minister Ilia Darchiashvili

Mr. Ambassador rightly pointed out, we are working very actively with Brussels so that the implemented reforms, on the one hand, continue, and on the other hand, with new initiatives, we can bring our country closer to the European family, both institutionally and legally, because this is the main line of our main goal. This is the final, full-fledged membership of the European family, the European Union, and we will take concrete steps in this direction,"



said Darchiashvili.

Darchiashvili expressed optimism regarding the candidacy status, underlining that this positive outlook is backed by the steps they have taken, their dedicated efforts, and their commitment to advancing the country's ambitious reform agenda. He is confident that these endeavors will be recognized and assessed positively by Georgia's partners.
