Giorgi Gakharia Says For Georgia Preparing for All Elections, Leaves Door Open for October Vote

In an interview on TV Pirveli, Giorgi Gakharia, leader of the opposition party For Georgia, said his party is preparing for all upcoming elections and has not ruled out participating in Georgia's municipal elections scheduled for October 4.

The statement comes amid heightened political tension and ongoing nationwide protests over the conduct of the October 2024 parliamentary elections, the government's foreign policy shift, and what opposition leaders have described as increasing authoritarianism.

"For Georgia may or may not participate in the local self-government elections, we are not ready to make that decision yet," Gakharia said during the interview, while emphasizing that political parties should always be prepared for any electoral scenario.

When asked whether the party would participate if early parliamentary elections are not held, Gakharia replied: "Of course, there is a chance," reiterating that their participation



would depend on the political context closer to the date.

"I am saying one thing: we are preparing for any next election, because if you are a political party, you should always be ready for elections," he added.

The comments come as other opposition groups are openly debating whether to boycott the

municipal elections. On Tuesday, Giorgi Baramidze, political secretary of Unity - National Movement, stated that under what he called the current

"Kadyrovisation" and "Belarusisation" of Georgia, his party, and "any other normal party" would not participate in the October vote

Chikvaidze Claims Georgian Government Forced Him to Lie About U.S. Embassy

Businessman Giorgi Chikvaidze, who is currently in pre-trial detention on charges of large-scale embezzlement, has released a public statement accusing the Georgian government of coercing him into making false claims against the United States. In a post published on his social media page, Chikvaidze referred to the current Georgian government as the "Russian regime," alleging they forced him to fabricate statements implicating the U.S. Embassy.

"After my illegal arrest on March 11, the Russian regime forced me to make a statement, in which I would lie, saying that the U.S. Embassy forced me, gave me directives to organize pro-European rallies and carry out other illegal actions," Chikvaidze wrote.

He further alleged that the campaign against him was initiated by officials within a "fraudulent government," and that he is willing to cooperate with U.S. investigative authorities to expose them.

"I would like to emphasize once again that this is a crime against the American state," he wrote. "If the issue of an American investigation is put on the agenda, I am ready to cooperate with their investigative bodies and personally expose the representatives of the fraudulent government who initiated all this."

Chikvaidze also raised alarm over his safety while in custody, claiming that "on the instructions of the Russian special services," he is at constant risk of being killed.

"My stay in this institution is not safe and I am at risk every day... they can carry out my kill at any time," he stated.

Georgian authorities have not yet responded to the accusations.

The Ministry of Culture of Georgia has officially dismissed Davit Doiashvili from his position as director of the Vaso Abashidze Music and Drama Theater, citing a prolonged suspension of the theater's creative activities despite ongoing state funding.

In a statement released by the Ministry, officials emphasized that the theater, formally known as the "Vaso Abashidze State Professional Theatre of Musical Comedy and Drama," is a legal entity of public law (LEPL) and, like other stateestablished entities, is legally obligated to fulfill the goals for which it was founded.

The Ministry noted that the theater had continued to receive funding from the state budget, yet its creative operations

envisaged by the founding goals," the statement reads.

According to the Ministry, public theaters must ensure that creative activities are conducted on a regular basis, especially when sustained by public funds. The decision to dismiss Doiashvili was framed as a legal and administrative measure necessary to restore the institution's functioning.

"Therefore, the Ministry of Culture, as the founding agency of the LEPL Vaso Abashidze Music and Drama Theater, has made a legal decision to dismiss the person responsible for the continuous and smooth functioning of the LEPL, the theater's director, Davit Doiashvili," the Ministry stated.

The Tbilisi City Court has imposed a bail of 20,000 GEL on opposition leader Zura Girchi Japaridze as a preventive measure following his refusal to appear before a parliamentary investigative commission established by the Georgian Dream party.

Japaridze, who leads the Coalition for Change, appeared at the court hearing where his defense team contested the proing sanctioned by Lithuania. The court, however, proceeded with the hearing.

Speaking to journalists after the session, Japaridze criticized the court's decision, saying, "In fact, there was no formal basis for using anything as a preventive measure, because I am not going to run away anywhere."

He also stated that he does not intend to pay the bail.

The project will enhance the country's electricity grid's ability to integrate a higher level of renewable energy by adding a

200MW/200MWh Battery Energy Storage System (BESS) to its transmission network at the Ksani Substation near Tbilisi. The facility will improve energy security, reduce Georgia's reliance on grid stability support from neighboring countries, and pave the way for greater private sector participation.

"ADB has been a long-standing partner in supporting Georgia's efforts to strengthen its energy sector," said ADB Country Director for Georgia Lesley Bearman Lahm. "This new project marks another significant step toward enhancing the country's energy independence. With abundant clean energy potential and ambitious development goals, Georgia is well positioned to unlock greater economic benefits from its renewable resources."

"Surplus energy generated during peak seasons can be converted to green hydrogen and traded on EU energy markets, strengthening Georgia's energy system and creating new economic opportunities.

The project will introduce

improvements in the legal and regulatory framework necessary for the inclusion of storage technologies like BESS and green hydrogen into the network. This will facilitate private sector investments in renewable energy penetration and the development of larger BESS facilities and green hydrogen.

The project supports the Georgian government's goals of reforming the energy sector, emerging as a regional platform for trading clean energy, and improving the efficiency of the transmission network, as reflected in ADB's Country Partnership Strategy for Georgia, 2024-2028.

The Ministry of Economy and Sustainable Development will oversee the project execution and implementation of policy reforms envisaged under the project, while the Georgian State Electrosystem will act as the Implementing Agency.

School Tbilisi. This special cultural event was held in the scope of Japan Weeks 2025 in Georgia. Ms. Ohner Toshiko (Tea Master name "SOHO") gave Furoshiki Demonstration and Lecture, and Ms. Komaki Yuu held Yukata Wearing Class (both residing in Stockholm).

At the beginning of the event, principal of the school, **Ms. Eteri Svanidze** expressed her grati-

tude towards the Embassy of Japan for their continuous support and spoke about the significance of cultural events at their school, which has been teaching Japanese language for 30 years. In recognition of its longstanding efforts in promoting Japanese culture and language education, in 2023 the school was awarded the Japanese Foreign Minister's Commendation.

Furoshiki is a tradi-

tional Japanese wrapping cloth, which is used to transport and wrap various items, such as gifts or lunch boxes. Furoshiki folding techniques range from simple knots to intricate wraps, allowing to elegantly package items of various shapes and sizes. A yukata is a casual summer kimono typically made of lightweight cotton, traditionally worn during festivals and other informal occasions. Unlike the more formal *kimono*, which is often made of silk and worn with multiple layers and accessories, the *yukata* is simpler to wear and more comfortable, especially in warmer seasons.

After the *Furoshiki* demonstration students had a chance to participate in the lecture and to experience folding techniques of *furoshiki* firsthand.

Following the event, students also attended Yukata Wearing class, where they were dressed in Japanese traditional clothing. This event provided an opportunity for students to deepen their appreciation of Japanese attire and aesthetics.
